We will be joined by DePOT's 2024-2025 artists-in-residence, who will share the work they prepared aligned with the "Race, Populism and the Left" research thematic.

Raechele Lovell, a passionate Artivist, is rooted on a block of The Haldimand Tract, colonially known as Kitchener, ON Canada. Her journey in the arts began as a child on tour with the polyrhythmic dance and music of her Caribbean heritage, igniting a lifelong quest for creative expression. As a bi-racial artist, with Afro-Caribbean and German Mennonite heritage, Raechele navigates the intricate intersections of identity, culture, and artistry. This rich tapestry of lineage informs her work, intertwining ancestral heritage with contemporary narratives and grounding her in a unique perspective as an Afro-diasporic artist on Turtle Island. As the Founder and Executive Artistic Director of DiverseWorks Dance Co., Raechele envisions a future where Afrocentric artistry thrives. Her latest project, "Uncovering Roots," delves into the historical and contemporary narratives of deindustrialization, exploring personal and collective resilience through movement. Through her unique artistic voice and vision, Raechele aims to inspire and champion change, inviting audiences on a journey of discovery and healing. Her work is a testament to the enduring power of art to connect, transform, and liberate.

Rémy Chhem (he/him), co-founder of the Super Boat Collective, is a longtime community organizer, particularly within the Cambodian community. Having been previously involved in the Montreal Life Stories project and the Centre Khémara, he is now focused on creating dynamic projects that foster bridges, collaborations, and dialogue between communities and generations. Within the Super Boat People, Rémy leads various projects related to community and family history in addition to culinary and horticultural knowledge. Outside of the collective, Rémy works as an academic researcher in the social sciences, specialising in political ecology and with a marked interest in history and envrionmental iustice.

For the last 12 years, Paul Tom has been drawing on the intimate to tell life stories with sensitivity. His films give a voice to those who are not always heard, creating dialogue and opening our arms to others. Born in a refugee camp in Thailand, his favourite themes to explore are the construction of identity, family relationships, and everything that touches on the fragile side of being human. His films Seuls and Bagages have been selected for some forty film festivals around the world, winning a dozen awards. He is also the author of the young adult graphic novel Seuls, published by la courte échelle.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Paris has a wide variety of options for accommodations. We recommend that you find lodging on the *Rive droite* (North of the Seine), near the 12 or 4 metro lines, which will facilitate travel between the three conference sites, for example, the north side of Montmartre hill (18e arrondissement) between the Château Rouge, Jules Joffrin and Lamarck-Caulaincourt metro stops. Alternatively, you can look in the 11e/20e arrondissements near the Nation, Père Lachaise, and Bastille metro stops.

GETTING TO AND AROUND PARIS

EU Travel Requirements: France is a member of the European Union and the Schengen Area. EU citizens have free travel in France. Canadian, American, British, Chilean, and Brazilian citizens have 90 day visa free travel within the Schengen Area. Please consult the French visa and immigration website for more details. DePOT is not responsible for securing you a visa, it is your responsibility to secure a visa, if needed, in advance of the conference. DePOT staff are happy to provide any supporting documentation, like a letter of participation.

You can get to Paris by air, road, and rail: Paris has multiple airports, the large international ones being Charles-de-Gaulle and Orly. Both airports connect to the city centre via rail. Paris has multiple rail stations, with high-speed trains servicing the rest of France and Western Europe.

Public Transportation: Paris is a walkable city with a variety of modes of public transportation. For all conference locations, we have included the Metro stop and line to facilitate easy travel from your accommodations to the conference venue. You can use a smartphone app, a Navigo smartcard, or purchase paper tickets at the metro station to pay for your journey. We **recommend staying on the 12** or 4 metro lines to facilitate easy travel to all conference locations.

Food & Drinks: Refreshments and lunches will be provided during the conference. Some breakfast items will be available at the start of the day to sustain those who don't have breakfast included in their accommodation rate. If you have any dietary restrictions, please ensure that you have included these in your registration form. Here are some recommendations from the organizing committee:



Maps:





FUNDING POLICY FOR DEPOT MEMBERS

DePOT members can receive travel funding to help cover their expenses. Register for travel funding at this link in advance of March 31. The amount of funding you are eligible to claim depends on where you are travelling from and which DePOT events you are attending. All recieving DePOT travel funding must keep their receipts in order to be reembursed. For meals, they can also claim a per diem as outlined in Concordia's travel policy. For France, it is a daily limit of €110, with €20.50 for breakfast, €32.50 for lunch, and €57.00 for dinner. Students and precariously employed affiliates are eligible to have their travel funding sent in advance. Please indicate this on the Travel Funding form. To ensure the responsible use of SSHRC funds, DePOT members who receive travel funding and do not attend the 2024 Project Assembly are not eligible to receive further SSHRC funding.
